On behalf of the men and women of the fire department, it is my pleasure to present the 2017 Annual Report of the Lake Havasu City Fire Department. The purpose of this report is to provide our residents with a snapshot of the activities in which their fire department is involved. We invite you to explore the contents and would be happy to further explain any of the information contained in this report. Please feel free to call our administration office or stop by City Hall if you have any questions.

I would like to take this opportunity to share a few of our key accomplishments. First, we are very proud to be recognized by the State of Arizona as an EMS (Emergency Medical Service) training site. As a state training site, we are able to provide custom instruction and continuing education to our Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians. A significant amount of time and expense is usually necessary to provide this required annual training. Our training site offers a custom program tailored to our equipment and protocols. It is cost effective, but more importantly, an exceptional training value.

We are also very happy to announce an improvement in our grade from the Insurance Services Office (ISO). On January 1, 2018, the property protection classification of Lake Havasu City increased from Class 3 to Class 2. The overall ISO evaluation is based on the combined efforts of the Police Department to answer and process an emergency call (9-1-1); the Fire Department in the preparation and response to a fire; and the reliability of hydrant water available from the Water Department upon arrival. Less than 10% of the communities in Arizona are able to reach Class 2. I want to thank and applaud the Police Department and Water Department as well, for this tremendous joint effort.

I hope you find this report interesting. We certainly hope you never find yourself in need of our services, but we are proud of what we do and want you to know we are here when you need us.



Property Protection Classification (PPC)

The Insurance Services Office (ISO) conducts a periodic review of the communities' ability to respond to and mitigate a fire incident. This review analyses 911 processing, pre-emergency planning, fire response, and the reliability of hydrant water. The Police Department, Fire Department, and Water Department are pleased to report that the PPC for Lake Havasu City was improved in 2017 from a Class 3 to a Class 2 and taking effect on January 1, 2018.

Lake Havasu City is one of only 23 Arizona communities to achieve a Class 2.





Fire Prevention Bureau

The Fire Prevention Bureau works cooperatively with the Building Department to monitor code compliance of new construction, remodels, and existing buildings. The Fire Marshal manages several functions:






Community Paramedic Program



The Fire Department Community Paramedic Program is designed to utilize paramedics in conjunction with the healthcare community to assist patients with chronic conditions.

The Paramedics do home visits to ensure that the patient is making a good recovery, knows when to call their physician, has all necessary medications, and understands the directions they received from their physician. The primary goal is to reduce the number of post discharge 9-1-1 calls.
